


Results of Communications Survey



What is your age


521 réponses

On the 19th of September, the <u>Canadian Consumer Price Index</u> (CPI) figures for August were released. The CPI rose 4.0% year over year in August, following a 3.3% increase in July. The headline acceleration was largely the result of higher year-over-year prices for gasoline in August (+0.8%) compared with July (-12.9%).

President's report on the 11th PSAC Quebec Triennial Congress

The 11th Triennial Congress of PSAC Quebec was held from Thursday June 1st through Sunday June 4th, 2023 at Trois Rivières. There were roughly 200 delegates from across our province representing federal government employees, university staff, full-time and part-time employees, those in components, and those in DCLs. They all had two things in common: the desire to represent their membership well, and the desire to improve the working conditions of all Canadian workers.

The PSAC has a structure with two distinct types of unions: those in components, and those that are directly chartered locals. The PSAC is a pan-Canadian union: there are unions in the east, in the west and up north. The PSAC is primarily a federal government employees union.

Components are comprised of union locals with the same employer and perform similar work. As an example, there are taxation offices across the country; each office has a local affiliated with the PSAC. However, they have the same employer and consequently the same collective agreement, and their negotiations take place at the same table. They are all members of the same component, the Union of Taxation Employees and they are covered by federal labour legislation.

Directly Chartered Locals (DCLs) are unions that were certified in a distinct location with a distinct employer and are not pan-Canadian unions. DCLs are subject to the labour laws of the province where they were certified. MUNACA is subject to the Quebec Labour Code, whereas components are subject to the Canadian Labour Code. This can be significant as Quebec, for the moment, has anti-scab legislation where federally, such legislation does not exist. We are a DCL, as is AMURE and AMUSE. There are differences: as I said we have one employer, in one location, with one certification, jointly owned by the PSAC and MUNACA. As an example, MUNACA's certificate covers, in general, non-academic support staff, AMURE covers research and postdoc staff, and AMUSE casual staff (usually, but not exclusively, students). DCLs in general are different. We are usually more independent, have different issues, have our own expertise and in some cases the means to pursue our own agenda. The thing we have in common, with other DCLs, is the lack of true representation at the various decision-making levels within the PSAC. At last year's meeting of Quebec union executives, I pointed out to Sharon de Souza, the VP on the National Executive, that the PSAC has invited DCLs to dinner but has placed us at the kids' table. The Conseil Quebecois, our version of the Union Council as it were, has 18 representatives and only 2 from DCLs.

There are many reasons for this but primarily you can see that the components have overwhelmingly more representation as compared with DCLs. In the PSAC Quebec unions, there are approximately 40,000 members: 20,000 from components, and 20,000 from DCL's. MUNACA has tried to redress this imbalance but so far to no avail.

Equity groups were also fighting for more representation on the Conseil Quebecois as they have been doing for lo these many years. I am certain that they may have been discouraged for a moment, but their fight is not over and they will continue with all due vigor.


Progress has been made for Equity groups and DCLs but for things to change, my experience tells me, said change will come in baby steps.

However, not all is gloom and doom. There appears to be a shift in the PSAC Quebec towards DCLs' positions, not a major one but reason to be hopeful. As I said, we passed one resolution in favour of DCL representation and Yvon Barrière was re-elected as Vice President Regional (Quebec). Yvon has been a friend to DCLs and to MUNACA. Yvon has represented Quebec and DCLs forcefully at the NBoD (National Board of Directors) in Ottawa and has included DCLs in Quebec's meetings of National Directors (Quebec) where we had no representation in the past.

I was particularly impressed with our delegates, mostly new to PSAC congresses, with their energy, commitment and how they presented themselves and represented MUNACA. They are the future of MUNACA and it looks bright. Thank You!!
